

Sustainability and Transformation

Europe is currently sinking into its deepest morass since the 1960s. Questions about the sustainability of European political economies, social solidarity, party systems, values and the project of European integration abound. Paraphrasing the famous quote from Giuseppe Tomasi di Lampedusa's great novel *The Leopard*, that "for things to remain the same, everything must change" many argue: if Europe is to reinvigorate its economy, society, politics and culture, transformations are necessary.

Sustainability, a concept borrowed from and often linked to ecology, refers to the capacity to survive, to remain diverse and productive into the foreseeable future. We invite papers and proposals that investigate the sustainability of current European policies and dynamics, as well as explore ways political actors can promote or damage sustainability. Threats to sustainability often emerge from exclusive attention to improving efficiency, reducing risk, boosting legitimacy, or strengthening social cohesion at the local level at the expense of the survival of the wider system in which these efforts are embedded. Companies successfully pursuing profit threaten their natural and social environment, investors trying to hedge their own risk endanger financial markets, national politicians pandering to voters and shunning international responsibilities to keep power imperil the global order, efforts to achieve ethnic, regional and national unity by fanning tribalism and xenophobia fracture relationships with other groups and generate large-scale conflicts. Are the refugee policies of the European states sustainable in the long run, or will short-term solutions destabilize Europe as a whole? Can the current policies governing the management of the European monetary union work for both individual countries and the entire union in the end?

Transformation refers to major change, in either form or substance. We invite papers and proposals that investigate the transformations Europe currently faces as well as the major changes required to respond to them. For example, emerging technology is on the verge of making renewable energy viable; advances in genetics are confronting European societies with new ethical and medical dilemmas; the combined power of communication technology and artificial intelligence is now poised to profoundly reorganize the way people live, think and work and even the way crime and terrorism occur or can be averted. Dramatic shifts in the transnational movement of people and the demographic profile of European societies are intersecting to create new challenges for European politicians and citizens. The drift towards right-wing populism is destabilizing democratic political institutions. These transformations are posing difficult problems and call for other major changes that deliver sustainable solutions.

Proposals may be submitted from August 15th to October 4th, 2016. Participants will be notified of the Program Committee's decision by December 14th, 2016. WELCOME MESSAGE

Dear CES Community:

Europe is facing an enormous number of social and economic challenges—slow growth and increasing inequality, stressed and in some places disintegrating welfare states, falling birthrates and rising immigration—which have helped generate enormous political challenges at both the domestic and European level. Populist and illiberal parties on the right and left have become significant players in many European party systems, reflecting and furthering deteriorating political consensus and obstructing the formation of stable governments and effective policy making. Illiberal and in some cases barely democratic governments have arisen within and on the periphery of Europe—in Hungary, Poland, and Turkey—openly flouting European Union norms and reversing the forward march of democratic consolidation that so many had taken for granted for so long. And of course, the European Union, which has been unable to forcefully respond to these and other challenges, is facing an unprecedented backlash, even from citizens in countries that have historically been most supportive of it. Understanding resilience—whether and how European countries and the European Union will have the capacity to bounce back in the wake of extraordinary stresses and challenges (like Rocky Balboa who graces our conference program's cover)—is of the utmost importance.

This year's CES conference thus examines resilience from a variety of perspectives. Over 900 scholars from a wide variety of disciplines participating in 225 panels, roundtables and plenaries will analyze the challenges Europe faces; various responses thus far attempted to deal with these challenges; the institutional and other prerequisites of flexible and effective political action; and the potential scenarios for a more prosperous and politically stable European future. The conference will also feature art works and short films that will explore these and other topics. In short, these three days in Philly promise to provide the most stimulating, comprehensive and thoughtful discussions and debates about the foundations, nature and prospects for European resilience to be found anywhere.

Along with all our participants, this conference could not happen without the tireless work of the CES staff, including our new executive director, Nicole Shea, PhD, the efforts of the program chairs (Mabel Berezin and Mark Pollack) and the program committee (Jan Willem Duyvendak, Julia Lynch, Peter Lindseth, Marla Stone), and the support provided by our local organizing committee (Julia Lynch, Richard Deeg, Orfeo Fioretos, Mauro Guillen, Dan Kelemen, Sophie Meunier, Mark Pollack, Tobias Schulze-Cleven, Rudra Sil, Dawn Teele). 

During the Cultural Revolution (1966-1976), Tang Deshang had an opportunity to photograph the students who were sent from the cities to the rural countryside. Optimistic at first, the students had a hard time adjusting to life in the countryside, the grueling labor, tedium, homesickness, and poor living conditions. As they were not allowed to return home, some married local people, and after ten years many grew depressed and despondent. Only two out of a hundred were sent back to the city. Displaying a remarkable resilience, those students are today’s global leaders, including Xi Jinping, President of the People’s Republic of China; Li Keqiang, Premier of the State Council of the People’s Republic of China; and Zhang Dejiang, the director of Standing Committee of the National People’s Congress.

Looking at the photos one can relive those moments in all their complexity. Tang’s work is invaluable because cameras were very expensive and people were not allowed to use them freely. In contrast to the staged images contracted by state agencies, some of these are spontaneous pictures and Tang is sometimes able to show the activities as well as the emotions of the participants. Part of the complexity of this project is its depiction of a positive aspect of the students’ lives, despite their extreme hardships in the countryside.

Paul Krugman holds two titles at C.U.N.Y. Graduate Center, distinguished professor in the Economics Ph.D program and distinguished scholar at the Luxembourg Income Study Center. In addition, he is Professor Emeritus of Princeton University's Woodrow Wilson School. He is best-known to the general public as Op-Ed columnist for *The New York Times*, a position he has held since 2000. In 2008, Krugman was the sole recipient of the Nobel Memorial Prize in Economic Sciences for his work on international trade theory. In 2011, Time magazine ranked his *New York Times* blog, "The Conscience of a Liberal," as number one in their listing of "The 25 Best Financial Blogs."

Mabel Berezin is a comparative sociologist at Cornell University whose work explores the intersection of political institutions and cultural meanings with an emphasis on challenges to democratic cohesion and solidarity in Europe and the United States. She is the author of *Illiberal Politics in Neoliberal Times: Culture, Security, and Populism in the New Europe* (Cambridge 2009) and *Making the Fascist Self: The Political Culture of Inter-war Italy* (Cornell 1997) which was awarded the J. David Greenstone Prize by the American Political Science Association and named an "Outstanding Academic Book of 1997," by Choice.

Martin Sandbu is the author of "Martin Sandbu's Free Lunch," an email briefing on the main economic issues of the day. Prior to this, he was the FT's Economics Leader Writer (2009-13). As part of the leader writing team, he contributed to shaping the FT's editorial line, with particular responsibility for international economic policy questions such as the eurozone sovereign debt crisis and the remaking of global financial regulation. He also contributes occasional longer pieces to the FT's features and news pages.



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
